This week saw Microsoft's first [Patch Tuesday](#) of 2014. It was a small one, with 4 updates correcting just 6 security issues.

What Do These Security Updates Do?

These [patches](#) from Microsoft update several individual files involved in making Windows and other Microsoft software work.

Do I Need These Security Updates?

You need these updates if you're running any edition of the following operating systems , 32-bit or 64-bit: [Windows 7](#) or [Windows XP](#).

There are no operating system security-related updates this month for [Windows 8](#) (including [Windows 8.1](#)) or [Windows Vista](#).

All supported versions of Microsoft Office are getting security updates this month too, as well as Microsoft Dynamics AX.

Really Microsoft?

Small annoyance? Possibly, but we're getting there, step by step!. It also seems to be a relatively small update so maybe that makes sense. Anyway, back to the **rumors**, here's a small bit of what is said to be included with this update:

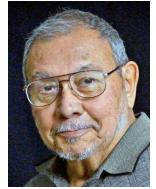
1. It will be possible to pin Windows Store apps to the Desktop Taskbar.
2. Some ability to "click to close" will be available for Windows Store apps. Both of those changes would benefit desktop users with a mouse and keyboard.
3. A future update (Windows 8.2? Windows 8.1 Update 2?) is **rumored** to allow Windows Store apps to run in traditional "windows" on the Desktop, not just full screen as it is now.
4. There may also be some return of a Start Menu of sorts.

Hello Fellow Members,

I am often asked what I think of Windows 8, so here are a few of my opinions now that I have been involved with this new operating system for a while, keeping in mind that XP support will no longer exist after March of this year, according to Microsoft's latest announcement.

Windows 8 takes a little getting used to so be prepared for that, although I didn't find it to be that difficult. You will quickly adapt, with little effort. The main difference seems to be the presence of all those 'Apps', like you've seen on many people's cell phone. Don't worry.... you can either choose to use them, or to simply ignore them. Being a 'creature of habit', I have chosen to ignore them. If you choose to use them, they are easily changed or customized for your convenience. Keep the ones you want, and delete those you don't want. If you're one who enjoys tons of shortcuts on your desktop, you can treat those 'apps' the same as you did your shortcuts and you'll get along fine. I prefer the old cosmetic appearance that I was used to in XP, Vista & Windows 7. Very few icons on my Desktop, with most in my 'Start/Programs' folder. Just a personal preference.

Interesting point: I have two computers with Windows 8 on them, (actually, now 8.1), and they each appear slightly different. One has an Intel processor and the other an AMD. Maybe that makes a difference in how Win 8 displays, I'm not sure yet, but there is an obvious difference after updating to vs. 8.1 on each computer. On the Intel computer, with the 8.1 update, I got the old familiar 'START/PROGRAMS' arrangement back, located down in the lower left part of the Desktop where we've been used to seeing it. Not quite the same on the AMD computer, but close. It seems to want to make the apps display as it's 'home page', or 'Desktop', but it's easy to keyboard to (what I call) the 'real' desktop using the Windows Key plus the 'D' key. (Note: **Later** I downloaded "Classic Shell" from a 3rd party, and now have the old familiar 'Start/Programs' on the AMD computer too).

Bottom Line

I have found NO problem with the new system crashing, balking or any other signs of trouble. It's fast, efficient and secure. Of course, the overall speed depends on your particular computer system's power. If you decide to download and install the 8.1 update, make sure you have plenty of time to devote to following through with the process, and make certain you're downloading it from Microsoft's site. It can take a fairly long time, and the computer needs to restart several times, so you'll need to be close-by during the process. Finally I got a colorful 'symbol' where our old system used to say START, that works the same as the 'old' start button used to. Suggestion: Create a 'Restore Point', before installing any update.

CONS

One thing I have found not so user friendly, but the jury is still out in case I still need to learn a better process but since I am a 'neat-freak' with my **Start/Programs** listing, I have always enjoyed the ability to arrange the shortcuts each in their own appropriate folder and in the order I prefer. For instance, any 'Graphic or Video' programs all grouped together in ONE folder called, "Graphics/Video". I found it a little more difficult to edit or create them in Windows 8 in the Start/Programs area. At times it will list all of my programs and other times it will only list only some of them. Hard to organize or edit a partial list, so that's just one small bump in the road I've run into, but have gotten the job done anyway, by 'copy/paste' process.

Compatibility

I've found only two, (quite old) small utilities that won't run on Windows 8. Everything else works seamlessly, and fast.

Windows 8: A big step forward for Microsoft in my opinion. Also: Check out their **SURFACE** tablet!

What? Macs don't get virus', do they?

The myth that Macs don't need malware protection has officially been busted. Fortunately there are plenty of choices for Mac security, some from companies familiar to PC security enthusiasts, and some from companies focused solely on Mac solutions.

[Malware attacks targeting Macs](#) should have made it abundantly clear that Mac owners can no longer go without an [antivirus](#). The "security through obscurity" that many Mac users have relied on over the years just doesn't stand up anymore (if it ever did). Fortunately, security vendors have made a wide variety of Mac solutions available. Most come from the familiar vendors who make the security software for your PCs; a few are Mac-specific. We've rounded up a dozen for your consideration.

Given the long-time perception that Macs don't need antivirus protection, you may not have budgeted for such a purchase. Don't worry! Fully half of those we've rounded up here are free. Social Engineering Protection

However, quite a few Mac antivirus solutions include some type of Web reputation reporting, to steer users away from dangerous or fraudulent sites.

QR (Quick Response) Code Suggestion:
